September 22, 1904: Teachers Contracts — John R. Reed, county superintendent, has compiled a complete list of all the schools in this county that have secured teachers and will have a term of school.

The number of the school district, not including those listed in the last issue, and the name of the teacher only is here given.

Owing to a want of information as to the amount of salary paid in a few of the districts, this part of the information has been omitted entirely, but the salary paid by schools outside of Goodland range from \$30 to \$60 per month, and Supt Reed says the average pay in this

county will not be less than \$40.

September 23, 1904: Good Music Rendered at Opera House by Well Drilled Players — Poverty and good band music never exist together in the same place.

That was proven last Friday night in Goodland when the Colby Military band, by invitation, gave a concert in the opera house for a percent of the receipts, and to get home the next morning, the band boys had to go down their pockets to the extent of \$20 to cover their expenses.

But the Colby men had the money, and there is where the prosperity idea comes in. Goodland people may justly be ashamed of themselves for their unwarranted slim patronage of a band that does not offend but pleases a musical ear.

A dance followed the concert, and rather than pay the concert price of 35 cents, some strolled up and down the sidewalk, or stood by the door and window, and thus sponged their way until the dance began.

The men of Colby band made a good appearance in their uniforms of blue coats, tan pantaloons and military caps. Before the concert, they played a few quicksteps on the streets.

The opera house performance

displayed good stiff work for the lead and harmony instruments, the refined and dulcet strains interspersing the passages of vigor and buoyancy.

There was strict obedience to time and power; both the ensemble and the individual playing was nicely executed. With the phenomenal growth among the people of Thomas County, there has been a corresponding increase and efficiency of their band which is evidence of the evolution of the aesthetic side of their economy.

September 24, 1904: To Denver and Back \$5.00 — Saturday, Sept. 24, the Rock Island will run a special train from Phillipsburg to Denver and return, the fare for the round

trip being \$5.00.

This is perhaps the cheapest rate ever made for a local excursion. The train arrives in Denver at 6 o’clock on the evening of the 24th and leaves at 12 o’clock, noon, Sept. 26, giving one a whole day for pleasure and a half day for business.

The special train leaves Goodland at 11:30 o’clock in the forenoon. This is a good chance for people who want a short outing or for those who wish to go to Denver on business.
