Brewster High School's new football coach is really an old face to area residents. Beau Sheets, former Colby High School and Chadron (Nebraska) State University football standout, is in his first year coaching the Bulldogs.

Sheets, who teaches math at Colby High, praised the Colby district for letting him coach at Brewster.

"They've been real good about letting me come over here," he said, adding that it can be a little hectic

putting a full day at Colby and coaching at the county-line town.

Sheets' parents, Scott and Vicki Sheets, moved back to the Brewster area last spring, so he isn't exactly a stranger. His younger brother, Tad is in the seventh grade at Brewster schools.

Sheets has an older sister, Sandra Brown, who lives in Sharon Springs. The coach and his wife Tara live in Colby with their 5-month old daughter, Kamdyn.

They have been married for two

years, but Sheets added, "We've been together since seventh grade."

Sheets was an all-state receiver and defensive back at Colby with 52 catches his senior year. At Chadron, he played wide receiver and returned kicks for a team that won the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference four years running and spent two years in the NCAA Division II Top Ten.

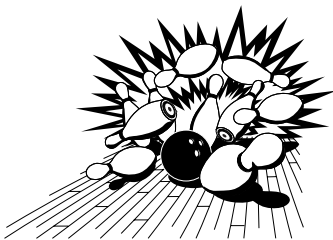

## 'Drive for Sobriety' helps raise money

The fourth annual "Drive for Sobriety," sponsored by the Thomas County Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council, was played Sept. 11 at Sugar Hills Golf Club, raising money to help people suffering from alcohol or drug abuse.

Winning the first flight in the four-man scramble tournament was the team of Marvin Selby, Jim and Devlin Mull, and Chuck Lutters, who finished with a score of 59 for the par-71 course.

Second in the first flight were Jarod Helin, Audry and Lou Hines, and Sceptor Brownlee with a score of 63. Third were Rick Ress, Scott Showalter, Aaron Krannawitter and Buddy VanHorn with 67.

First place in the second flight went to Larry Struckmeyer, Daniel Crottinger, Darrel Pattillo and Bob Kinderknecht with a 66. Bea and Kay Driver, and Keith and Pat Willoughby was second with 67. Third were Dean Dinkel, Bonnie Selby, Sidney Strait and Rachel Taylor with 71.

Brownlee won the men's longest drive contest and A. Hines won for the women. The prize for a hole-in-

one went unclaimed again this year.

"It was a wonderful tournament," said Pat Willoughby, the fund-raising chairperson. "We had a great time and the weather was beautiful for a change."

Willoughby said although the tournament had competition from other events in the area, resulting in fewer participants and less money than last year, she considered the event a success. This year the tournament brought in about \$4,100 compared to just over \$5,000 in 2003.

The money helps pay for the council's services for people with drug and drinking problems. Those include specialized counseling for alcoholism and drug addiction, family and group therapy, and a drug-and-alcohol information program. Willoughby stressed that the money raised stays in the northwest Kansas area.

"We appreciate so much the participants and sponsors of this year's tournament," she said.

Willoughby said next year's tournament will be the fifth and promises it will be "really special."

## Three Cowgirls medal at Ulysses tournament

The Cowgirls golf team placed three of its players in the top 15 Thursday at a junior varsity tournament held by Ulysses High School at the Bentwood Golf Course.

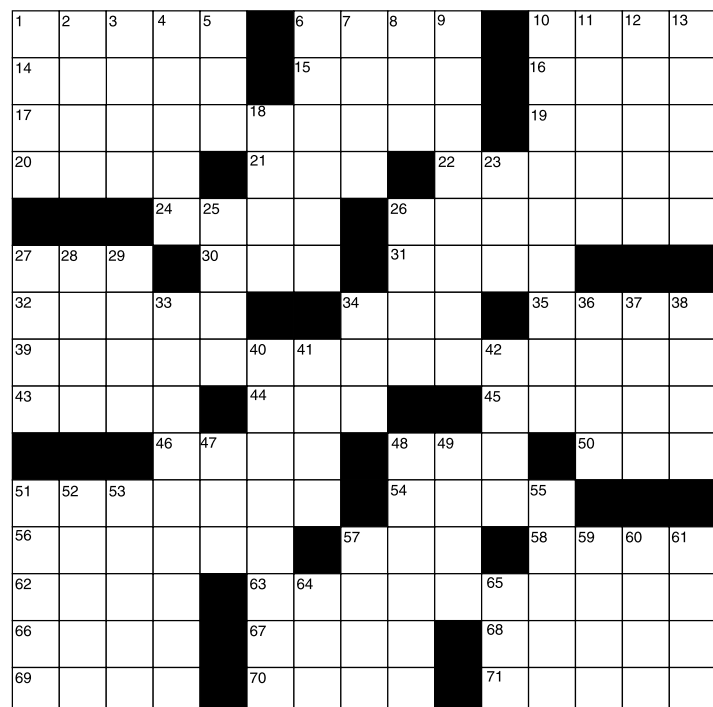
