## **Cops leave training** to put bite on fugitive

Colby Free Press A training exercise for law enforcement agencies in Colby on Thursday turned into reality, when a traffic stop on I-70 turned into a manhunt.

Eventually, a "well-placed bite to the hand" corralled one of two men caught with what officers described as 200 pounds or more of marijuana.

Thomas County Sheriff Tom Jones said handler and police dogs from his department, along with the Colby Police and Russell and Ellis County sheriff's departments, were training at the Thomas County Law Enforcement Center

He said the officers and their dogs were working in the impound lot when the call came, and they loaded up rushed out to a field near I-70.

Lt. Doug Griffiths of the Kansas Highway Patrol said a state trooper stopped a truck west of Colby, and one of the men took off, skittering through a milo field to the south of the rest area.

"It went downhill from there," Griffiths said.

He identified the men as Rey- Loaiza about 5:15 p.m. naldo Javier Loya-Grageda, 30, and Abel Cota-Loaiza, 42, both of Thomas County Jail. Mexico.

They were pulled over shortly before 3 p.m. at mile marker 49 near the eastbound rest stop. Officers later found nearly 200 pounds of what appeared to be marijuana in drug tax stamp, conspiracy to disthe truck box

A trooper put the cuffs on Loya-Grageda, but Cota-Loaiza took off. Jones said sheriff's deputies, police officers and troopers converged a helicopter from Salina but it was on the rest area, which was shut down to all traffic.
