

# New Yorker rolls van, scatters wreckage

A New Yorker rolled his van and lost his load when he came back too soon after passing a semi-trailer truck on I-70 near Ruleton about 4 p.m. Wednesday.

Officer Roger Studer of the Sherman County Sheriff's Office reported that a gray 2003 Ford van with a trailer driven by Hans R. Stenner, 45, New York, was passing a black 2002 Peterbuilt and trailer driven by Daniel M. Hofbauer, 54, Raytown, Mo. Stenner pulled back into the right lane too early and struck the front corner of the semi. The van rolled into the south ditch, while the trailer came unhitched and lost the load landing in the ditch.

Stenner, Hofbauer and his passenger Teresa Hofbauer, 47, were all wearing seat belts and there were no injuries. The van and load were cleaned up and removed by Stage Stop Sinclair.

## Hospital pushes cancer test

Call today. It could save your life.

Goodland Regional Medical Center is joining forces with thousands of Americans in National Breast Cancer Awareness Month in October.

Women can schedule a mammogram by calling 890-6033, said Brenda McCants, director of patient relations. Call your doctor if you notice any changes or have questions about the disease.

Goodland Family Health physicians are available for those who do not already have a doctor, she said — call 890-6075 for an appointment.

Much headway has been made in the past 19 years, McCants said — more and more people are aware of the disease, how men and women can reduce their risk and the need for research.

The awareness month began in 1985, she said, through the work of former first lady Betty Ford, a breast cancer survivor, and her daughter, Susan Ford Bales.

They set out to make support and early detection information available to women, McCants said.

Today, thousands of health care organizations support the event through community outreach, screenings and education.

Death rates from breast cancer dropped 2.3 percent every year during the decade from 1990 to 2000, McCants said, in women of all ages.

McCants said the American Cancer Society attributes the decreases to earlier detection and better treatment.

Despite the drops, she said, breast cancer rates have increased in men and women aged 50 and over. The disease is the most commonly diagnosed non-skin cancer in women.

An estimated 215,990 new cases of invasive breast cancer will occur in American women this year, McCants said, and about 1,450 are expected in men.

# St. Francis woman takes friend on \$1,000-shopping spree

Houtman said he won his spree the day after his 87th birthday and Cullum won her prize a week before her 86th.

"Isn't that something," she said. "I guess it's just a birthday present." She began spending her thousand at Wane's Carpet and Drapery, buying the Capture system, a dry cleaner for carpets.

Her next stop was Mann's Jewelry and Gifts, where she went directly to a black onyx ring with a gold band she had picked out earlier. She said she was replacing a



similar ring she had lost. The next stop was Aten Department Store, where she bought a brand new leather jacket for Houtman. She stopped into Aten's again after lunch and bought herself a winter coat, a new pair of shoes, two rugs, a couple of blouses and some pajamas.

After that, the shopping contin-

ued at Miller's Electronics, where Cullum bought roof tar to fix a leak. She shopped the isles and even tried out a rocking chair, but decided she didn't have room in her house.

The couple had a free lunch as they stopped at sponsor Hank's Cafe for french fries and chicken sandwiches. Cullum bought a \$100 gift certificate for the cafe because

Although they live in St. Francis, Cullum said she takes the 35 mile drive to Goodland often with Houtman. They come down to play bingo at the Elks Club and visit the Veterans of Foreign Wars. They also visit Cullum's family, her son and

daughter-in-law Ole and Pat Juhl; her granddaughter and husband, Shaunna and Tim Armknecht; her nephew and his wife, John and Bobbie Harkens; and her nephew Danny McCurry.

They said they eat and shop often in downtown Goodland.

Cullum said she had a good time and she got "a lot of nice things." She said she was shocked to win the prize.

"You're just stunned when you get called," she said.

# Goodland youth has top steer, sells it for nearly \$13 per pound

A Goodland youth had the top market steer out of 120 shown at the Kansas Junior Livestock Show in Wichita over the weekend.

Three other Sherman County youths competed in the event; one earned a first place in class, and another had a champion and a second place in class.

Jace Mosbarger, Goodland, had the grand champion market steer. The winning steer is a 1,283 pound

crossbred. Brad Julius of Derby paid \$12.96 per pound for the steer at the Auction of Champions at the show's conclusion.

Ryan Taylor, Goodland, earned a first in class 10 with a Hampshire market barrow, and Clay Schilling, Edson, had a champion limousin market steer and was second place in class 41 with a commercial breeding heifer.

Taylor also finished fourth in jun-

ior swine showmanship and 16th in class 20 with a crossbred market barrow.

Garrett Taylor's Yorkshire market barrow was ninth in class 14,

and his Duroc market barrow was ninth in class 6. The statewide event featured 646 4-H and Future Farmers of America members exhibiting 1,218 head of livestock.
