October 6, 1904: Little Newses — An acrobat and “two chairs” gave an exhibition of what they could do on the streets of Goodland Saturday. Taking the collections as a basis, the acrobat did five dollars’ worth of work in thirty minutes.

Maidens to Sit Together at Meat and Drink — All the bachelors of Goodland, old and young, and the maidens who as yet are “alone in the world” are being invited by the Ladies’ Aid society to be present at the opera house next Tuesday evening, Oct. 11, from seven to eleven o’clock, to eat, drink and be merry.

The coming event has been named the “Bachelors Banquet.”

All young ladies are invited without written invitations and are urged to come and make the banquet a big success.

It will not be a pitiful, but a joyful congregation of jolly maids, who think men horrid things and marriage a failure, and of men who would rather remain single than to join hands with fickleness, fuss and feathers.

Since this is the case, there is liable to be something doing in the program of toasts, which follow the feast. The maid will give the bachelor a piece of her mind, and the bachelor will respond and tell what’s what.

The opera house will be brilliantly illuminated for the festivity; decorations will be made and tables for sets of four will be provided, and good things to eat will be in abundance.

Bachelors and maids will be admitted free, but supper will cost the

festive banqueters 25 cents per plate. The question of admitting married people to the banquet has arisen on account of some wanting to go, and it has been decided to admit them for an admission price of 10 cents at the door, supper same rate as bachelors.

All maids will meet at the home of Mrs. Sapp at six o’clock the evening of the banquet, preparatory to go to the opera house. The bachelors will have to go to the banquet alone, if they don’t come away that way.

October 8, 1904: Muldrow News — Wednesday evening the W.C.T.U. gave a mush and milk social at the residence of David

Robinson. There was a fair crowd present, and an enjoyable time was spent.

October 9, 1904: W.A. Sexson of Grant township has settled the apple question for himself at least; and by example, for many others who, if they will, can prove the same thing to their profit and pleasure.

Mr. Sexson has a fine young apple orchard of modest proportions, and it is estimated that there are 30 bushels of apples on the trees.

Millipedes are invading homes; help available

Again, we are seeing millipedes invading homes. Millipedes, or “thousand-legged worms,” are an arthropod relative of insects.

They can be distinguished from centipedes by the number of legs per body segment. Millipedes have four legs per segment, while centipedes have only two.

Also, the millipede’s legs are quite short and may not be seen if viewing the millipede from above.

Though usually found in damp locations outside, they can become a problem inside the house.

Household invasions can be sudden and sporadic.

most often brownish-black in color.

The legs ripple as they move. Millipedes often curl up

into a “C” shape like a watch spring if touched.

Remember, you may not see the legs unless viewing the millipede from the side.

They defend themselves by releasing a disagreeable odor when disturbed.

Millipedes require high moisture to survive and often die in a day or two after entering a house. Dead millipede bodies can then be vacuumed up and disposed of.

Drying out moist areas inside will also help with control. Sealing and caulking around openings in the foundation will help keep populations low.

If this is not enough, spraying cyfluthrin (Home Pest Control Indoor/Outdoor Insect Killer), proxiopur (Baygon), or resmethrin in a three-foot band around the outside of the house will help take care of them before they get inside.

Mental Health Awareness Week on calendar

The first week in October is Mental Awareness Week and includes National Depression Screening Day.

This year, the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill is emphasizing President Bush’s New Freedom Commission on Mental Health and the need to transform our nation’s mental health system.

This commission’s final report on mental health emphasizes that good mental health is a key to overall physical health and should be

treated with the same urgency.

The New Freedom Commission on Mental Health said in their report that too many Americans are unaware that mental illnesses can be treated and recovery is possible.

A wide array of effective mental health services and treatments are available, the report said, yet too many people remain unserved.

Stigma is a huge barrier, it said, particularly among older adults, ethnic and racial minorities and residents of rural areas, thus

prompting many people to hide their symptoms and avoid seeking help.

Mental disorders often co-exist with other medical disorders. For instance, depression is also common in people with coronary heart disease and other cardiac illnesses.

Depression can also impair self-care and adherence to treatments for chronic medical illnesses, said Karen Beery, manager of the con-

sultation and education department of High Plains Mental Health in Hays. Good mental health improves the quality of life for people with serious physical illnesses and may contribute to longer life in general.
