# University seeks gifted high school students

The University of Kansas is looking for 100 gifted Kansas students in grades eight through 12 to attend Duke University Talent Identification Program Scholar Weekends this month in Lawrence.

The program, set for this weekend and next, will offer intensive courses taught by KU faculty and graduate instructors. The students will be challenged academically while get-

ting a taste of university life.

The Scholar Weekends are available to any Kansas student who has been identified as gifted or talented or has participated in Duke's Talent Identification Program.

Each student will choose one of the following courses: Oct. 16-17: Writing With Diplomacy; Mathematics and Music; or Aerospace Engineering; Oct. 23-24: Commu-

nicating Politics and Leadership; Architecture; or the Language, Culture and History of Germany.

Participants will arrive on campus Saturday morning; take part in classwork all day Saturday; spend the night in the Lawrence Holiday Inn Holidome, supervised by university resident counselors; and return to campus Sunday for a full class day scheduled to end at 4:30 p.m.

The courses will be in Fraser

Hall, KU's signature building on Mount Oread, which can be seen for miles. The cost for each weekend is \$350 with overnight lodging or \$300 without lodging.

The lesson at the meeting was on antimicrobial resistance and food supply, referring to bacterial growths. Terms we should know are:

- Antibiotic, a chemical substance produced by a microorganism that can kill or inhibit the growth of another organism. One type of antimicrobial agent.
- Antimicrobial, a substance that kills microorganisms or suppresses their multiplication or growth. It may be naturally produced or made synthetically and includes antibiotics.

- Antimicrobial resistance, the ability of some organisms to resist or fight medicines that should inhibit or kill the organisms.

- Microorganism, microscopic organism, such as bacteria.

- Subtherapeutic, an amount of a drug given that is below the level needed to cure the infection.

- Virus, minute infectious agent without independent metabolism, requiring living host cells.
