The Goodland Cowboys found quarter. that the way back to the winning trail went through Clay Center on first play Friday, as they beat the Tigers 39-8 in the first district game of the sea-

The win improved Goodland's Center's record to 6-1. In the other District D a n n y 15 game, the Concordia Panthers whipped the Eagles of Colby 64-36.

Goodland established it's dominance early against Clay Center. After the Tigers returned the opening kickoff to their own 30-yard line, the Cowboys held Clay Center to a "three-and-out" series, forcing a punt. With first and 10 from the Goodland 47, senior fullback Brock Lohr gave the Goodland bench had an early scare when he fumbled the ball the Tigers recovered.

However, the Cowboy defense pushed Clay Center back on three straight plays, forcing another punt. Starting with first and 10 from their own 26, the Cowboys drove 74 yards, picking up five first-downs along the way and scoring on a 10yard pass from senior quarterback Derrick Raymer to senior tight end Bret Jarmin. Four plays later, the Goodland defense returned the favor, stopping the Tigers on a fourth-and-three.

Taking over on their own 40, the Cowboys drove down to the Clay Center 8, helped along by a 34-yard pass from Raymer to Wilkens. With third and goal from the 7, Raymer again found Jarmin with a touchdown pass to make the score 19-0. The two-point conversion attempt failed.

The teams exchanged punts after stalled drives, and the Tigers attempted to punt on fourth and eight from their own 37. The kick was blocked and Goodland senior David Livengood picked up the loose ball, running 22-yards for a touchdown. The two-point conversion failed, but the Cowboys' lead was now 25 points.

Grater returned the subsequent kickoff 38 yards to the Goodland 47. Three plays later, Tiger quarterback Kyle Allen ran 44 yards for a touchdown. He then hit Daniel Colton for the two-point conversion, making the score 25-8 with over $11 \frac{1}{2}$ minutes left in the fourth quarter.

"We started the game kind of sluggish in the first half," said coach Jon McLean, "but by halftime felt we were in control of the game even though we didn't have a commanding lead. Lohr led the Goodland ground attack, gaining 170 yards on 40 carries and scored three touchdowns. Senior tailback Lane Winter picked up 24 yards on four carries and Henderson 25 yards on four.

Raymer completed three of eight passes for 51 yards and two touchdowns, both to Jarmin. He was intercepted once. Raymer's other pass was caught by Wilkens for 34 yards. Raymer ran 11 times for 103 vards.

Livengood led the Cowboy de-The Tigers' final drive made little fense with nine tackles. Jarmin had seven tackles, including a sack for a 10-yard loss. Senior Brandon Cowan, junior Jase Herl and Lohr each had six tackles.

The Cowboys return to their home spread Friday, when the Concordia Panthers visit Cowboy game Class 4A. Kickoff is at 6 p.m.

lines," said Harrel. "We'll try to prioritize very carefully."

A spokeswoman for the Rural Health Ventures Clinic in Goodland said they only have a few doses. Right now, the clinic is only giving the shots to established patients who meet the high-risk guidelines.

Dale Shields, director of human resources for Goodland Regional Medical Center, said hospital employees won't get free vaccinations this year due to the shortage.

"We usually offer (vaccinations) free to employees," he said. "We're going to really have to scale back." The health department normally gives out over 1,000 doses of the flu vaccination each year and Rural Health holds clinics, administering around 600 shots a year.

Harrel said she hopes to get the 25 percent of their order from Aventis by the end of the month to begin limited vaccinations. She said they will advertise and campaign to let the public know when they get their supply.

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
