The Goodland Star-News The Cowgirls volleyball team ended its season Saturday with second place at the Class 4A sub-state tournament in Hugoton, losing to Colby 25-20, 20-25 and 25-18 in the championship match.

In its bracket, Goodland defeated Larned 25-10, 26-24 in the first round then beat Scott City 25-6, 26-24 in the second. Colby defeated Russell 25-8, 25-6 then Pratt 25-13, 25-19 to get to the title match.

In their first game against Colby, the Cowgirls fell behind 4-0 but fought back to tie the score at 7. The score was tied 10 times after that, but at 18-all the Lady Eagles scored four straight points behind the serve of junior Lacee Cooper to go ahead 22-18 then hung on for a 25-20 win.

In the second game, Colby again jumped out to an early lead, 3-0, and again Goodland came back to tie the game at 4. Then things turned out differently, though, as the Cowgirls scored three straight points, then five of the next six to go up 12-5. After that, Colby got within a point at 21-20. Then the Cowgirls scored the final four points behind the serve of junior Jordan Frazier.

After a "carry" call on the Eagles made it 22-20, junior Justeen Koehler tapped the ball over an attempted block by Colby for the next point. The Cowgirls' 24th point came on an ace by Frazier which caught the Eagles looking. The winning point was on a spike into the net by Colby.

With the match tied at one game apiece, it was Goodland's turn to take an early lead at 4-1 and Colby's to come back to tie, which the Eagles did at 5. From there Colby never trailed, building up to an eight-point lead twice, at 23-15 and

In the first game of each of their first two matches, the Cowgirls easily handled their opponents, but they had to win both second games 26-24.

Goodland dominated the first game against Scott City, jumping out to an 11-3 lead, but then Bedore went to the service line. The Lady Beavers had a tough time with her jump serve, and by the time she was done, the score was 20-4. The Cowgirls then won five of the next seven points, getting the winning point on a kill by sophomore Emily Murray.
