Henry Schultz

Henry O. Schultz, 85, a St. Francis-area farmer, died Sunday, Oct. 24, 2004, at Wray, Colo., Community Hospital.

He was born Feb. 14, 1919, in Cheyenne County, the third of nine children of Paul and Lena Schultz.

At age 10, he started working on the family farm, and by 12, he was driving a tractor. After finishing his freshman year of high school, he was required to work full time.

In 1937, he met Margaret Wickwar while attending barn dances, ball games and plays. On Feb. 1, 1940, they married, and they had four children.

In 1945, he moved his family to the Walz place and initially did ranching and farming with his brother John. About eight years later, he decided to focus just on farming and expanded his operation to over 2,000 acres.

Carpenter was killed on job by falling timber

Sherman County Historical Society October 31, 1904: WAS KILLED WHILE AT WORK – Leeman Dougherty, a Carpenter, Struck by Falling Timber — Was Hoisting Iron Pillars at Masonic Hall With Gang of Men When Accident Happened — Death Was Due to Cerebral Hemorrhage — Leeman Dougherty, carpenter, employed on the Masonic hall building, in process of construction, received a death blow on the head at nine o'clock Monday morning by the falling of a 'horse' from the floor of the second story.

The old adage is misfortune never comes singly, and it is sad and true in this incident, for, on Tuesday, Mr. Dougherty, a widower, came Mamie, their nine year old daughter, who was taken sick the day before her little sister, also died with the same disease, leaving the home desolate, and, such as only can be appreciated by those who have passed through a like experience.

> There is no death quite so sad as that of a little child, unless it be that

of the mother of young children. The tiny hands have so close a touch upon the heart strings, and the wee one's presence fills the home so completely that the hopes and ambitions of all the household becomes wrapped up in the future of the little ones.

Now these two lie side by side in the Shermanville cemetery, a spot now sacred more than ever before. This burial ground is only a mile distant from the Knight country place, and Mr. and Mrs. Knight felt that they had rather have their loved ones interred near the old home.

The school children contributed generously of the finest flowers in the Goodland homes, and the people of our city are touched with deep regret at the taking away of the children by the dreaded disease.

Nellie Knight, who is 11 years of age and was to first to have the scarlet fever, is rapidly recovering.
