Postmaster got check

November 2, 1904: Government Paid Sherrod Two Cents — H.M. Sherrod, a rancher and farmer living in the northeast part of this county feels rich since he received last week a check from the post office department for two cents.

This check is beautifully printed on safety paper, countersigned, etc., and would look better with a more generous amount than two cents.

But Uncle Sam owed Mr. Sherrod, as post master of Charlotte, that amount ever since the Charlotte post office was discontinued two years ago, although not then known.

Mr. Sherrod was the postmaster at Charlotte for eight years and this, the only error.

After two years it was discovered, and a check for the amount was made out and returned to Mr. Sherrod.

November 3, 1904: Monday was Halloween, and the youth of Goodland were out in force, not only turning things topsy-turvy, but doing damage.

It is all right to have a good time and to show the boyish spirit in tricks that do not actually injure anyone, but when it comes to tearing up a sidewalk in front of a

church and destroying the coal box belonging to a church, then Halloween hazing ceases to be a virtue.

November 4, 1904: On Wednesday, the keystone was placed in the center front of the new Masonic hall building, which is in process of erection on 10th and Boulevard.

The list of officers of the different Masonic bodies and roll of membership together with a copy of the News and the Republic and other documents of importance were encased in the hollow of the keystone.

The face of the keystone bears the inscription, “Goodland lodge, No. 321, A. F. & A. M., 1904 - A. L.

5904.”

November 5, 1904: Jacob Trachsel, a farmer living about four miles southeast of Goodland, last spring put out 20 acres to potatoes, and the result is that he has about 1,200 bushels of potatoes.

This simply shows what can be done in the way of agriculture in northwest Kansas without irrigation, but with the right kind of farming methods.
