Hearing for coach delayed

A preliminary hearing in arson charges against former Goodland High School foot-

ball coach Tony Diehl was put off last week by District Judge Jack L. Burr in Sherman County District Diehl Court.

Diehl, 34, 1108 Harrison, was arrested in August for attempted arson at his home. Neighbors noticed flames and called the police, who searched the house and arrested the coach.

After a night in the Sherman County Bastille, Diehl was charged in District Court with arson, a Level 6 person felony, and released on a \$25,000 supervised bond.
