Headstone dedication 3 p.m. Sunday honors two Fort Wallace army scouts

In a ceremony honoring men who served their country 136 years ago, the newly erected federal headstones of Forsyth scouts Thomas O'Donnell and Abner "Sharp" Grover will be dedicated at 3 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 7, in the old Fort Wallace Cemetery in Wallace.

The afternoon's featured speaker will be Dr. Orville Cricqui, author of "50 Fearless Men. The Forsyth Scouts and Beecher Island."

Dr. Cricqui has been largely responsible for securing the headstones from the U.S. military.

O'Donnell and Grover, who were among 50 scouts hired by the legendary George Forsyth, participated in the Battle of Beecher Island, which took place on September 17-18, 1868, near present-day Wray, Colo.

O'Donnell was mortally wounded in the battle and later died at Fort Wallace.

Grover survived to play major roles in the early history of the fort and in the lives of such legendary characters as William Comstock.

The U.S. military has determined that, though both men were officially designated as civilian scouts, their service to the U.S. was such that they were deserving of official military headstones.

Following the ceremony, there will be a warm meal served at the Clark-Roubidoux House in Wallace.

Enjoy food and fellowship in the grandeur of the neo-gothic home, which is being restored to its 1880s glory.

In-house entertainment will accompany the supper.

First diphtheria case identified, Winsell family gets quarantined today in history

November 6, 1904: A Mr. Peterson of Cedar Bluffs, Neb., a wealthy man and a brother-in-law of Adolph Fiedelius, was in Goodland last Thursday.

He came especially to visit Mr. and Mrs. Fiedelius but found, to his surprise, that they had moved to Stradhuus, Denmark, a year ago or so.

Mr. Peterson's visit was also marked with an episode figured in by "Dad" Auer.

Twenty years ago, Mr. Auer, then living in Cedar Bluffs, was appointed by Pecks & Gallagher, receivers, to sell a large stock of merchandise, and among the purchasers at that time was this man Peterson, who bought a bill of \$200 worth of goods.

They had not seen each other since that transaction, but still they had not forgotten, and after a few questions as to who's who, they knew each other and talked over things of 20 years ago.

November 7, 1904: Case of Diphtheria — Mattie Winsell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E.T. Winsell, was thought to be seriously ill Saturday night with an affection of the heart, which on Monday was pronounced to be diphtheria by Dr. Carmichael, the attending physician, although the disease had not made its well-recognized appearance in the throat.

The Winsell residence was promptly quarantined.

The disease made but a feeble attack in the throat, most all of the toxic effect exciting the heart.

Mattie is up and about the house, and the quarantine will be lifted in a few days, after the regulations governing disinfections, etc., shall have been complied with.

This is the first case, and no others are reported.

An examination of some of the

throat exudation in the Knight cases of scarlet fever, examined by the state board of health and sent in by Dr. Carmichael, showed the presence of diphtheria germs.
