Another Indian raid Saturday

The Goodland Star-News For the third time this season, there is a band of Indians out to beat up the Goodland Cowboys on the football field.

The first two couldn't do it.

This time, the tribe from Andale High School will try to unhorse the Cowboys on their way to the state championship game. The game kicks off at 4 p.m. Saturday at Cowboy Stadium.

Andale won its bi-district game on Tuesday 55-7 over Anthony-Harper-Chaparral High. The Indians finished the regular season 6-3 and in first place in District 13. All three of their losses were to other Class 4A schools, two of which made the playoffs, though both lost in the first round. The three losses came in the first five games of the season, and the Indians are now on a five-win streak.

Goodland coach Jon McLean said Andale's strength is its running game. He said the Indians like power football, using a lot of double-tight-end and full "T-back" formations. Full T-back is when all three running backs are lined up behind the quarterback.

McLean said Andale has three sophomore running backs who are not only fast and quick, but physical. He said the Indians have good size up front to create the holes the backs have been running through.

In order to win, Andale will have a fumble recovery he returned 14 to do something only two teams have managed to do this season: hold the Cowboys' rushing attack has 61 tackles along with an interunder 200 yards.
