Roger Michael

Roger Brooke Michael, 68, Brewster, retired pastor of Living Waters Church, died Wednesday, Nov. 3, 2004, at Citizens Medical Center in Colby.

He was born Dec. 21, 1935, in Brewster, the son of LaVelle P. and Gwendolyn Marie (Hilton) Michael. His young years were spent between Colorado and Brewster.

He attended country schools in and around Brewster, and he graduated from Brewster High School in 1953

He enlisted in the Navy and reported for active duty in February 1954. He spent the next 10 years and nine months in the Navy. During that time, he was stationed in Hawaii, the Philippines, Japan, Kansas, Texas, back to Hawaii, Louisiana and Florida.

On Nov. 25, 1956, he married Sally Jean Smith of Goodland at LaCrosse. They began their years together at the Naval Air Station in Hutchinson. He could never hear "Anchors Aweigh" without tears in his eyes.

The Michaels had five children, Brad, born in Kansas: Brian, born in Texas; Brooke, born in Hawaii; Beth, born in Florida; and Barry, born back in Kansas. They returned to Brewster in 1964 to raise their family.

Mr. Michael worked for Farmers Co-op and attended the Northwest Kansas Vocational-Technical children. School, where he graduated in 1968

He followed Barnett's advice, and Jones and Michael formed Evangel Ministries. This organization lasted until 2001, and they were well known in every jail and prison in the area.

Michael was also blessed to have the opportunity to pastor, and his family from Living Waters Church was as much a part of his life as his natural children.

He liked hunting and fishing and was a member of the American Legion; the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program; National Rifle Association; Full Gospel Businessmen's Fellowship International; the International Assembly of God in San Diego, which is where he held his ministry papers; the Independent Assembly of God; Clergycare; and the Brewster Ministerial Alliance, but what was most important to him was the family of God.

Michael had been ill and is now pain-free.

Preceding him in death were his parents and a brother, Paul.

Many votes were cast and much interest shown in election

Sherman County Historical Society November 9, 1904: ELECTION RESULTS DIVIDED — Heavy Vote Cast and Much Interest Shown in Results — Associated Press News Received All Night at the Opera House — The election in Sherman County resulted in a mixed ticket, both sides participating in the victory. The republicans got five of the county offices and the democrats eight.

The day here in which the people chose their servants, from the president of the United States down to the road overseer, was cool but pleasant. No disturbance marred the day, and in the city of Goodland, teams were going all day taking voters to the polls.

The shops shut down in the after-

noon to give all the employees there time to cast their ballots. A large vote was cast all over the county, and in Goodland perhaps the largest in history.

Returns were received at the opera house, where large crowds assembled to hear not only the local election news, but to hear the reading of associated press dispatches from over the states, which were was "right" or "wrong," for the pretaken off the wire here and messages sent to the opera house every twenty minutes.

Thus it was that the people of Goodland on election night had almost as good advantages to be up to date on the latest news as had the people in the large cities of the

United States; and they knew before they went home that night — if straw show which way the wind is blowing — that Roosevelt had probably carried the country.

Considerable interest was taken in the Colorado election for governor, and now and then a whoop of gladness or a howl of disgust would break forth, according as the report vailing sentiment was "Anybody

but Peabody.'

Meanwhile the reports from the city and county precincts kept coming in. The vote clearly for Roosevelt in this county, but for local candidates it was capricious and told another tale.

Thus it was that no candidate knew his fate until the big vote from the large precincts came in. This election gives both parties in Sherman County encouragement and a clutch of political power, for future contests. Roosevelt carried Goodland by 59 votes; Reeder for & Scott's advertising space, headed "Are You A Sucker?"
