Scarlet fever appeared in two more homes

November 26, 1904: New Scarlet Fever Cases — The Disease Makes Its Appearance in Two More Homes — This week scarlet fever broke out in two more homes, Jennie Hubbard, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S.B. Hubbard, and the little child of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Arensberg, having been taken down with the disease.

Reports thus far are favorable, and the health officer, A.C. Gulick, is trying to make an end of the infection.

A child in Engineer Hartman’s family is getting over scarletina. The physicians are unable to ascertain the origin of the infection, but some people have been led to think that it came from winter garments which had been put away and again brought out for use.

Last winter scarlet fever was very prevalent in Goodland, and in fami-

lies where it then existed, it is not unlikely that the disease may have returned in this manner.

November 27, 1904: To Hold Basket Social — The ladies of the Woman’s Relief Corps, who want to see the people of our town have a good time once in awhile, and, incidentally, to gather up a modest amount of money to pay off some indebtedness, have planned to give a basket social at the Union hall on the evening of December 9, which falls on Friday.

A general invitation is extended to the public, and since baskets will be brought both by blooming young ladies and by the jolly but older corps ladies, the bidding will vary according to fancy.

However, a limit on the price of the baskets has been placed, and baskets cannot sell above \$2. An

“eye contest” will be another attraction.

In addition to good things in the basket and the hot coffee, which will be served free, a program of music and speeches will add its charm and make you glad.
