November 26, 1904: New Scar-Makes Its Appearance in Two More Homes — This week scarlet fever broke out in two more homes, Jennie Hubbard, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S.B. Hubbard, and the little child of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Arensberg, having been taken down with the disease.

Reports thus far are favorable, and the health officer, A.C. Gulick, is trying to make an end of the infection.

A child in Engineer Hartman's family is getting over scarletina. The physicians are unable to ascertain the origin of the infection, but some people have been led to think that it came from winter garments which had been put away and again brought out for use.
