never be found. Family members have ideas about who was responsible, and feel that the former sheriff did not do everything he could have.

One reason some think McClelland might have run away before deputies arrived that night was that he was on probation for a drug conviction, and because he had a knife, he might have had his probation revoked and had to spend time in prison. However, family members believe even the threat of prison would not have stopped McClelland from at least calling home to see if it was OK to return.

"I don't believe the threat of prison was that great," Sheriff Butts said. "This was his first drug offense, and I do not believe that would have kept McClelland away this long without some contact with his family."

Other things complicate the investigation, including the fact that a woman who was with McClelland that night, the only witness to the

> Deputies searched around The search did not turn up any sign

of McClelland. Whitson said the he may be alive and hiding. deputies found a set of footprints they felt were his tracks heading to the southwest, but they lost them after a quarter of a mile.

Whitson said the footprints were not from anyone involved in the search, but there was no proof they belonged to McClelland.

Butts said he went to the home of McClelland's sister, Tammie Skrdlant, where she lived with Leonard Barnes about 3 1/2 miles north of Pedens', and asked if she had seen him. Butts said he spent some time on a nearby hill watching with a night vision scope to see if McClelland was heading to his sister's.

"I saw some deer and other animals," Butts said, "but no sign of any person."

A couple of weeks later, 17 volunteers and eight deputies walked, rode and flew a seven-mile section of Beaver Creek southwest of Peden's shop, hoping to find clues to the disappearance. At the end of the day, Whitson said at least he felt the search proved McClelland was not lying in a field in that area.

Since then, the sheriff's office has followed up on a series of rumors, but there has not been any contact from McClelland.

Opinions are split about whether him and to allow him to participate should call him at 899-4835.

Whitson said he listed McClelland in the National Crime Information computer in January for breaking probation because of his disappearance. Whitson said it was a way to get him in the nationwide criminal computer system to give his disappearance the broadest possible exposure. Missing person cases don't get that kind of treatment.

County Attorney Bonnie Selby said in January that McClelland had been sentenced on Nov. 3, 2003, on charges of unlawful manufacture of a controlled substance, and possession of a narcotic with intent to sell within 1,000 feet of a school. She said he was transferred to Community Corrections, and agreed that McClelland's disappearance violated the terms of the sentence. That could mean he would face prison time if he returned, she said.

McClelland and his wife Elaine, 40, were among six people arrested on Jan. 8, 2003, and charged with the cultivation of marijuana, possession of narcotics and drug paraphernalia, and manufacturing of methamphetamine.

Selby said McClelland's attorney, Paul Oller of Hays, arranged with the Union Pacific to reinstate

in their drug rehabilitation program, which he completed in the summer of 2003. Though he was reinstated, the railroad laid him off last November because they did not have any work.

Some people believe Jimmy Mc-Clelland is alive and will be found through a traffic stop somewhere in the country.

"I don't know what to tell his mother," Sheriff Butts said. "We need to find out what happened to bring this to a conclusion.

"Just not knowing is terrible for the family. I want to get Jimmy's picture out again, and maybe someone will remember something.

"The sightings have slowed down, but we will follow up on everything. I know that Jan and Elaine (McClelland) have checked out a couple of sightings where people thought they saw Jimmy, and there was nothing."

Butts said he hopes that keeping the case fresh in people's minds will produce a new lead. He said the case if far from being solved, and he is hoping with the public's help there. may be some new facts that give him a chance to find the answers.

She said former Chevenne County Sheriff Ray Lee of St. Francis offered to help, and he had talked to over 100 people in Sherman County about the missing man.

She said Lee called the KBI and the FBI to try to get something more

"We sent the KBI all the information," she added, "but we never heard a thing."

While his mother has hope of finding Jimmy alive, she is no longer certain.

"Maybe he's alive somewhere," she said, "but I don't think so. It is a hard thing to say.'

Jan McClelland said she was upset more was not done within the first few days, and thought a more thorough search of the Peden farm should have been conducted.

"I don't have any respect for Doug Whitson," she said. "I liked him, but was disappointed that he did not get a search warrant for Peden's home."

Whitson said Monday he did not get a search warrant because the argument had been at the shop and nothing happened in the house as far as he knew. He said one of the deputies did do a quick walk through of the Peden home that night.

"I know that Doug Whitson thought Jimmy would show up that night" Sheriff Butts said "I think we all thought that at first, but I do feel some things were not handled right that first night and in the next couple of days.' "Î am not sure Peden killed Mc-Clelland," Whitson said Monday. "but it would be nice to find him to answer all the questions." His mother said reports that Mc-Clelland had violated probation were not accurate.

Day. I know him. I was with him for 17 years.'

His wife agrees with her motherin-law that Jimmy is probably not alive, saying that if he was he would have called home to see if it was safe to come back.

"I don't think he was in that much trouble," Elaine said, "and I know he would not stay away this long without making some sort of contact."

His mother said Jimmy's friends, who helped organize the search last year, have stayed in contact and that none of them have heard from him.

For the missing man's family, life just seems to be getting harder. Elaine said that Jenny, 16, and Tyler, 13, have been through a tough year, and that their friends keep asking

them about their father. She said she recently lost her job because Jenny, who has suffered the most, had a seizure, and she was unable to go to work.

"I am looking for a job," she said. "I have been looking around here, but have not found anything. I have enough to get through the next month, but after that I am not sure what we will do."

"He hadn't broken his parole," she said. "He had made all his meetings, and the parole officers said he was doing what he was supposed to do."

"He couldn't leave his kids this long," Elaine said Saturday. "He loved his kids, and I know he would have called.
