Seal and gasket company's lease on agenda

The Aircraft Seal and Gasket Corp. lease is on the city commission agenda for a meeting at 5 p.m. Monday.

Questions about the operation of the company were brought to the commission in October. At that time, the commission decided to give the company until December to comply with its lease and show they were actually producing at the plant, in a building which the city remodeled last year at a cost of over \$500,000.

City Manager Ron Pickman brought the question to the commission in October after the city had been told that the company's insurance has lapsed.

Since then, Aircraft Seal and Gasket has hired at least two people and has been producing seal parts which are being delivered to its plant in Wichita.

The commission is expected to agree to continue the current lease, which grants the company free rent for the next year.
