December 4, 1904: 'SUN-SHINE LECTURE' — The little old man, hoary headed, possessed of a happy face and a voice that once had more melody, was Dr. A.A. Willits, the apostle of sunshine, who gave his 'happiness' receipts to the audience at the opera house Monday evening.

He said that he had come all the way from his New Jersey home to talk to the people of Goodland and treated the audience to many illustrations from life and bits of written wisdom that makes for happiness.

"I like the man that does his best, and leaves the rest—Don't worry," he said. His subject was as broad and universal as sunshine, but the kernel of his lecture was this sort of philosophy from Paul: "I have learned in whatsoever state I am,

December 5, 1904: Rumors That Cheyenne and Rawlins Counties are Infested With Thieves — If reports be true, history is repeating itself in northwest Kansas and contiguous territory, and cattle rustling of old has come to be a new thing. AnAtwood, Kan., dispatch in the Kansas City Times, says: "Cattle extensive scale in northwestern

Kansas, eastern Colorado and southwestern Nebraska that the ranchmen are becoming alarmed for the future of their industry.

"There are more cattle 'rustlers' the in the counties of Cheyenne and Rawlins in Kansas; Arapahoe, Kit Carson and Yuma in Colorado; and Dundy and Hitchcock in Nebraska than have ever before operated in those localities.

> "It is estimated that this band of thieves has stolen in the neighborhood of \$35,000 worth of cattle in the seven counties within the last two years. Every indication points to a thorough organization of the thieves.

"One of their headquarters is said thieves are operating on such an to be along the Little Beaver Creek in Cheyenne and Rawlins in this

they operate is a ranch several miles southwest of Burlington in Kit Carson County, Colo.

'These ranches are the meeting places of the thieves, and much of their stock is kept there until the brands can be changed. A favorite plan of operation of the rustlers is to run off the young stock and after changing the brands, keep the animals unto no traces of the old brands can be seen.

'Yearling steers with brands which can be easily changed are especially desired by the thieves, and ranchmen with such stock are compelled to be extremely careful in their watch over it.

'The ordinary round hole punched in the ear, which has been used by many ranchmen to mark calves, offers no difficulties to the cattle thief. He either tears the hole
