"We are making a dent in our drought," he said. As of Thursday, the precipitation total for the year was up to 21.38 inches, 1.78 inches above normal. December has, however, been drier than normal

With better than average rainfall this fall, Goodland with rainfall amounts at 0.02 of in inch. The month is normally dry with an average total of 0.45 of an inch.

> Floyd said the year to date number is roughly 7.5 inches above rainfall totals here last year.

Although Goodland is still classified in a drought, he said, we may be turning a corner with the added moisture.

"It has really helped replenish the subsoil," he said.
