Former Goodland woman borrowed millions, left men holding bag

Sherman County Historical Society December 24, 1904: Old Residents Identify Pictures of the Now Notorious Goodlandite — Mrs. Cassie Chadwick, of Cleveland, Ohio, the woman who has astounded the financial world by borrowing millions on her face, ending in the wreck of banks and leaving rich men holding the sack, once dwelt among us right here in Goodland say our old timers.

She came here rather mysteriously in 1889 and gave none her history, save that she was Madame De Vere; bred the impression that she of the upper crust and possessed of plenty of money.


