# Debate raged about meaning of 'blizzard'

Sherman County Historical Society December 30, 1904: Coldest Wave of the Season, Accompanied by Snow — Sunday night the wind blew bitter cold, and Monday the thermometer hovered around zero with a blow of snow now and then.

This was the third snow of the season, and since the ground has been soaked and cracked open with the cold, farmers think the ground is in better condition than for years.

People have taken to calling these severe storms blizzards, which is objected to by F.D. Colburn: "I wish the newspapers would not call this storm a 'blizzard,'" said Secretary F.D. Colburn of the State Agricultural society Monday.

"The weather bureau has officially stated that we don't have 'blizzards' in Kansas, and it does not look well to advertise every little storm that comes along as a blizzard.

"Kansas has had enough troubles of its own without getting the credit of having 'blizzards.' I never saw a blizzard; nobody in this country ever saw a blizzard, unless they happened to be up in the extreme northern part of the prairies near the Canadian boundary. This storm we are having today is about as much like a blizzard as a gentle water spring is like a flood.'

Northwest Kansas has not had a blizzard for years, but it has nevertheless been visited by that very thing. Webster's International dictionary says that a blizzard is a "gale of piercingly cold wind, usually accompanied with fine and blinding snow; a furious blast."

To the old timers, Webster does not begin to tell what these furious. killing storms were back in the latter part of the '80s. Man or beast

way was as hopeless as in a wilderness of utter darkness: men were frozen to death within a stone's throw of their homes. Those days and the blizzard are embalmed in acre, and on this investment has history, with no desire for their return.

could not weather them; to see one's ment. There is a great influx of people who desire western land, many who have been renters in the more populous centers of Kansas.

Prices range from \$3 to \$10 per been yielding great returns during the past two or three years when sown to wheat.

Go to any thrifty farmer's place in this county and you will find plenty of grain in the granary, perhaps a large amount of corn and an abundance of rough feed for cattle. He has a good herd of cattle, and every indication points to the fact that our western people are on easy street.

Their homes are free from debt, the first of the year in the Heston and few are borrowers. While land is cheap, they are extending their holdings, and tomorrow they will be men of greater financial power than their eastern neighbors.

> Whenever the Campbell system of agriculture has been employed, the success has scarcely been short of marvelous. All are agreed that by the employment of better farming methods, good wheat crops will be certain in western Kansas.

Hence it is that old timers, who thought for many years that this is nothing but a cattle country, have changed their views; they can see a big agricultural future for the west. Helen Kimber, president of the

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Kansas Equal Suffrage association and who promoted a Kansas agricultural exhibit in Chicago last fall, second to none, has placed before the people of the east, writes: "I believe that western Kansas is going to be even more profitable as an agricultural section than that of the eastern part."

Miss Kimber has been in Goodland several times and has traveled over western Kansas enough to support her predictions with reason.

Where ever the Campbell system is given any sort of chance," she said, "it has more than made good. The farmer who takes the time to become acquainted with what the experiment stations of this state are doing for him will find that his brains will save his feet many useless steps, and his time will become more valuable, although he will put less of it in grubbing away as he did in the past. Brains count, and the outcome of scientific agriculture is making the practical modern farmer a better and richer man."

The farmer of Sherman County should get hold of a sufficient acreage of land before a sharp rise in price puts it beyond his reach, for there is a good time coming, and he that hath shall be made fat.
