To be in the Red Hat Society, the women have to be over 55, Smith said, and the oldest in the Goodland group is 91. The idea for the society grew out of a poem by Jenny Joseph, Smith said, and is now all over and growing like mad.

And no wonder. The cost is low -no official dues, only \$2 per person when it's time to renew the charter — and the women have so much fun in the "girls only" club.

When planning activities, Smith said, the members don't ask their husbands if they can go. Linda Pfau said one thing her husband Mel doesn't question is the red hats. As one of her "sisters" said, "He knows better.'

The Goodland chapter was born out of a group of four who traveled together. Smith, Pfau, Vickie White and Carol Guyer went to Breckenridge, Colo., together, Smith said, and had a lot of fun.

She said she was making a scrapbook afterward for the group, who called themselves the "Ha Ha Sisterhood," after the movie the "Ya Ya Sisterhood." Then she went online and registered the group with the Red Hat Society.
