Business men wanted big hotel in Goodland

January 25, 1905: HOTEL PROPOSITION UP AGAIN — Business Men Want Big One Built and Will Aid the Right Man — The revival of interest, having for its object the erection of a large and modern hotel in Goodland, is again at full tide.

The same proposal originated back about a year, and considerable endeavor was then made to interest outside capital to build. The enthusiasm finally wore itself out, but the need remained.

Hence the hotel question is still a live one. The Commercial Club met, and any enterprising hotel man who has some capital to start with will be materially assisted in this enterprise.

There is no doubt that the building location would be donated and

a reasonable amount of money loaned to carry the proposition through.

Goodland, with its 1,600 people and steadily growing; and with surrounding agricultural country full of promise, which today is attracting the attention of home seekers and investors — these conditions are the auspicious omens surrounding the hotel proposition. The opportunity is after the man.

January 26, 1905: A proposition to build a brick hotel two stories in height and 80 feet deep, on the site of the old Commercial hotel, was discussed and canvassed this week.

A bonus of \$1,000 to anyone who would build and operate such a hotel, with at least 25 rooms, steam

heat, and other modern appliance, was proposed and so far \$850 has been subscribed.

D.A. Derby, who owns and operates a boarding and rooming house on Broadway, signified his inclination to accept the proposition providing the lot and the \$1,000 bonus be donated.

Mr. Derby has made a success of his rooming and boarding house, and would, we believe, make a success of the venture. Thomas P. Leonard offered, if needed, to lease for hotel use, his furnished rooms in his brick building adjoining.

Goodland needs just such a hotel as is proposed, but to build and furnish it would call for an outlay of \$10,000.
