## Forest service retires tree bundle and replaces it with two new ones

The Kansas Forest Service's Conservation Tree Planting Program is retiring its wildlife bundle this year and replacing it with two new ones, an eastern upland game bird bundle, designed primarily to attract quail, and a western bird bundle more suited for pheasant.

The Quail Unlimited and Pheasants Forever organizations are both endorsing the new upland bird bundles.

Kansas wildlife officials are pleased too because they've long been concerned about changes that have been shrinking the habitats needed by two of the state's major game birds.

Upland game birds need grassy areas, travel lanes, cover, nesting areas, food and water. The Eastern seven-foot Peking cotoneasters, a



Quail and Pheasant Bundle is 75 sumacs, which grow well in most grow in both clay-loam and sandy orders in December for spring delivbare-root shrubs that are widely

adaptable in Kansas. As its name implies, it will attract pheasants, as well as quail. The shrubs go four feet apart and include equal numbers of:

• Thicket-forming, six-to-12-foot American plums, which grow well everywhere except dry uplands.

• Dense, drought-hardy, five-to-
