

Citizens realized Goodland needed fire company

February 4, 1905: Movement by a Few Citizens to Start an Organization for a Fire Company—There are two kinds of people in the world: One that puts off locking the barn until the horse is stolen, and the other that acts as if best safety lies in fear. This applies to fire protection, and it has been suggested by V.W. Goodrich that a fire company be organized in Goodland. To start a good thing along, Mr. Goodrich says he has \$1.00 to start a public subscription for funds, and he knows two more persons that will give

\$5.00. That makes \$11.00. Do we hear any more?
Mr. Goodrich says he is not so young as he used to be, but if it comes to a show down, he would be willing to crawl out of a warm bed on a frosty morning and tug the hose cart at the alarm of fire.
That wouldn't be any more than he has done in the past, when about two years ago he showed public spirit at the time Darling's barn burned. Methodically enough, he

and one other man rushed to the water works for the hose cart. The rest of the town ran swiftly to the fire.
Of these two courses it is hard to determine which was wisest. The fellows who ran straight to the fire could do nothing; neither could Goodrich and his lieutenant, for in trying to start the cart, their very eyes bulged out with the effort while the wheels, rusted to the axles, scrubbed along like sleigh runners on the

ground.
It was a bad job all around—sadder helplessness, though, followed in less than half an hour when on that same day, a whole business block was completely fire swept.
The wheels of the hose cart are rusted fast yet.
February 5, 1905: Muldrow News—Twin babies were born to Mr. and Mrs. Kyle Mann last Tuesday, but one of them died soon after birth. Dr. Gulick was in attendance.—T.J. Wilson erected his new Sampson windmill last week and now has two pumps in operation. He has been troubled about keeping a

sufficient supply of water for some time. —J.G. Jackson is putting down a well on his place. —C.F. Fiechter and C.A. Albright sold barley in Brewster last week.
February 6, 1905: Too Much Discipline—Some mothers pride themselves on the picture of their children sitting mutely in a corner, holding hands, when guests are present, as they do upon the spick and span condition of their china closet, and by general consent this has come to be looked upon as something greatly to be desired.
But such discipline, while it is impressive, really bottles up a great

deal of native energy and intelligence of the child.
Children that are permitted to discuss questions within the bounds of reason with their elders invariably manifest a spirit of self reliance and composure as they advance in age, which is very much more important to them than the ability to sit back and say nothing.

Forest service retires tree bundle and replaces it with two new ones

The Kansas Forest Service's Conservation Tree Planting Program is retiring its wildlife bundle this year and replacing it with two new ones, an eastern upland game bird bundle, designed primarily to attract quail, and a western bird bundle more suited for pheasant.
The Quail Unlimited and Pheasants Forever organizations are both endorsing the new upland bird bundles.
Kansas wildlife officials are pleased too because they've long been concerned about changes that have been shrinking the habitats needed by two of the state's major game birds.
Upland game birds need grassy areas, travel lanes, cover, nesting areas, food and water. The Eastern

Mongolia native well-adapted to Kansas.
• Very drought-hardy, three to six feet high
fragrant sumacs, which grow well in most

soils.
Two of the three Western Kansas Pheasant and Quail Bundle plants are native varieties found mostly in western Kansas. The 100 shrubs go six feet apart and include:
• 25 Peking cotoneasters.
• 50 thicket-forming, three-to-four-foot sand hill plums, which grow in both clay-loam and sandy

soils.
• 25 thicket-forming, two-to-eight-foot high skunkbush sumacs, which grow best in dry, sandy sites and do not tolerate flooding or high water tables.
Cost for the eastern bundle is \$60. The western bundle is \$80.
The forest service began taking orders in December for spring deliv-

ery and planting. Many popular offerings often run out before the order-taking period ends in early May.
