

# Eagle fans cheered Super Sunday at party in lounge

Philadelphia Eagles supporters soared as a group of fans gathered at the Wild Card Lounge at Goodland's Howard Johnson for the big game. The Eagles took on the New England Patriots in the epic 39th Super Bowl. The Super Bowl Party and Bud Night started with beer buckets and buffalo wings. Throughout the evening, the bar featured Budweiser give-aways. The hotel moved one of the pool tables to another part of the bar to make room for the party, which started at 3:30 p.m., an hour before the game. Each participant was given a string of shiny Mardi-Gras style plastic beads. The group crowded around a large television, but some

watched smaller screens that hang in the bar. As the game started, the crowd, of mostly Eagles fans, cheered its team. The first few laughs came from the famous Super Bowl commercials. Spots cost advertisers a reported \$2.4 million for 30 seconds. The first quarter ended in a 0-0 tie, but as the Eagles made the first touchdown in the second quarter the bar exploded into cheering. The back-and-fourth game prompted alternating boos and cheers. The half ended in a 7-7 tie. Half time featured former Beatle Paul McCartney. By the end of the game, the Patriots claimed victory, 24-21, winning their third championship in four years. The Eagles made a run in the final minutes to make it close, but the Patriots were able to run out the clock to seal the win.

## Cowboys wrestle today

The last opportunity for Cowboy wrestling fans to see their team in action at home is tonight when Goodland plays host to Oakley starting at 5:30 p.m. at Max Jones Fieldhouse. Oakley finished third at the Northwest Kansas League tournament held Jan. 29 in Atwood. Two Plainsmen won their weight class at the tournament with three others finishing second, another third and two placing fourth. One of the highlights in today's dual meet could be at 135 pounds where senior Dexter Deeds faces Oakley senior Levi Younkin. The two met in the championship match at the league tournament where Younkin won a 3-2 decision. Younkin, who won the state Class 3-2-1A title at 125 pounds last season, is ranked No. 1 at 135 in Class

3-2-1A by the Kansas Wrestling Coaches Association. Deeds, who won the Class 4A title at 125 pounds last season, is ranked No. 2 at 135 in Class 4A by the association. Two other Plainsmen wrestlers are ranked among the top six in their weight class. Senior Shawn Kuhlman is No. 3 at 145 pounds. Kuhlman, who placed fourth at the state championships last season at 145, lost a 7-2 decision to Hoxie's Michael Schamberger in the championship match at the league tournament. Senior Jeff Dennis is ranked No. 6 at 171 pounds. Dennis lost by technical fall to Derek Ross of St. Francis in the championship match at the league tournament. Besides Deeds, three other Cowboys are ranked in the top six in

Class 4A. Sophomore Brett Bahe is No. 1 at 112 pounds, junior Mark Starr is No. 2 at 215 pounds and sophomore Jon Cook is No. 5 at 160 pounds. Both Bahe and Cook won their weight class at the league tournament. Starr placed second. Cowboy coach Randy Bahe said he believed the team's motivation is back up near where it belongs and that the wrestlers are ready. He said although Goodland may have the edge "on paper," Oakley has some quality wrestlers and the Cowboys will need to be prepared in order to win. Coach Bahe said the junior varsity will be in action Saturday at the novice tournament in Colby which starts at 9 a.m. (Central Time). The regional tournament will be held Feb. 18-19 at Colby High School.
