The Goodland Star-News For the second time in eight days, the Goodland Cowboys needed overtime to win a Northwest Kansas League game, but this time they got to do it for the home crowd.

On Feb. 11, the Goodland boys went to overtime in Oakley to beat the Plainsmen 72-67.

Friday, the Hoxie Indians visited Max Jones Fieldhouse to play Goodland in the final league game of the season for both teams. A controversial call at the end of the fourth period disallowed an apparent basket by Goodland junior Jase Herl leaving the score tied at 67. That forced a four-minute overtime after some vocal criticism of the officials' eyesight.

The Cowboys went on to outscore Hoxie 12-8 in the fifth period, winning the game 79-75.

"It was a great team victory," said coach Jon McLean. "We hung tough the entire game."

The crowd saw the lead change 26 times, 13 in the fourth quarter alone. The teams stayed close in the first period, with the Indians leading at the end 15-14.

The lead changed six times in the first four minutes of the second quarterthen, with Goodland leading 24-23, freshman Jance McKee hit a threepointer, giving the Cowboys a fourpoint lead. Apair of free throws by Herl made it six, then another three-pointer by McKee made the score 32-23. Goodland led 37-32 at halftime.


The Indians improved to 20-0 overall for the season while Goodland fell to 14-5.


