March 2, 1905: Dr. F.A. Carmichael received a dispatch Tuesday to come to Chicago to assist in a delicate surgical operation. He left Tuesday evening.

March 3, 1905: FOUND DEAD ON THE PRAIRIE — Roger Clemens, who had weathered the storms of life for 77 years, dropped dead on the prairie 12 miles northwest of Goodland, still "on duty."

He was herding sheep for W.E. Frazee, who lives on section 3-7-40, in Voltaire township. Sunday morning, Mr. Clemens went out with the on the prairie.
