Sherman County Historical Society March 14, 1905: Says He Will Prosecute — E.F. Murphy, in the following letter, predicts a penitentiary vacation for city officials.

"Noting the agitation of the public and press, relative to the qualities required by the next mayor of Goodland, and of the saloon situation, I desire to state that everyone knows, to wit: That any man (except a druggist with a legal permit, and then acting within the limits of the law) who sells liquor in Kansas, commits a crime and violates the law of the state, and any mayor or councilman who, by any arrangement, express or implied, who per-
