Former Cowboy places fifth

Former Cowboy Bryce Abbey ended his college wrestling career last Saturday with a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Division II National Finals in Omaha.

Abbey, a graduate student at the University of Nebraska at Kearney, won 134 matches in his fouryear career, making him the winningest wrestler in school history. He started the 2004-2005 season as a senior, earning a Bachelor of Science degree in exercise science in December.

Abbey is one of only two Loper wrestlers to have earned All-American honors four times. To receive All-American recognition, a wrestler must finish among the top eight in his weight class at the national tournament.

Abbey was ranked No. 4 at 125 pounds going into the tournament by the NCAA Division II Wrestling Coaches Association.

In the first round on Friday, Abbey defeated Chas Welch of Northern State University (S.D.) by an 11-1 major decision. In the second round, Abbey won a 7-4 decision over Ricky Randazzo of Mercyhurst College (Pa.).

In the semifinals the next day, Abbey faced Aaron Graumann of Augustana College (S.D.), who won a 5-4 decision. Graumann, the top-ranked wrestler, went on to win the national title.

In the consolation bracket, Abbey lost a 3-2 decision to Dustin Tovar of the host University of Nebraska at Omaha. Tovar, ranked No. 3 in the latest poll, went on to place third. Abbey placed fifth when Jamie Thomas of Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania had to forfeit due to medical reasons.

Abbey, the son of Mike and Lorrie Abbey of Goodland, is a 2001 graduate of Goodland High. He is currently working on a master's degree in exercise science.

The Lopers, as a team, finished sixth overall with four wrestlers placing among the top eight. Senior Adam Keiswetter was third at 133 pounds, earning All-American honors for the third time.

Redshirt freshman heavyweight Tervel Dlagnev finished sixth and junior Jeff Sylvester placed seventh at 197 pounds.

This was Nebraska-Kearny's second-best finish ever at the national tournament, after the Lopers' second-place effort in 2003.

The Mavericks of Nebraska-Omaha won the national title with Augustana second and Minnesota State University of Mankato third. The Mavericks had three individual champions while the Vikings of Augustana had two. Fort Hays State University finished 22nd in the 32-team field.
