County got soaked, expected big harvest

March 20, 1905: Soaked By Continuous Rain — Unprecedented Since 1892 — The best singers of our agricultural prospects for this year have quit merely humming and in their enthusiasm have begun to sing, 'The Harvest Shall Be Great' — Sherman County is so wet that it can't remember when it was more water soaked.

today in history

Mud handicaps everybody and is on everything. These equinoxial rains, which have soaked the land to a depth that discourages investigation, date back more than a week.

The first appearance was in the form of snow that melted as soon as it touched the ground. A little later, the temperature turned the precipitation to rain.

Then for forty eight hours, the land was wrapped in a London fog. The moisture-laden atmosphere collected into rain clouds, dispensing a liberal and continuous rain.

As far as the eye can see, the sky is dark and the sun has not been able to penetrate the clouds. The oldest farmers look into each others faces and say that a better winter and spring never come to the west, and that the crop year of 1892 can no more than rival thus far the present

They point to the fact that great crop years in western Kansas must be preceded by a hard winter, copious spring and summer rains. These ety. Since the paper was published requirements thus far have been weekly, some items were arbitrarily admirably met, and they reason assigned a date.

well enough that where a chain of three events produce a certain result, and two of the links are regular and positive, the third and last will probably follow.

March 21, 1905: St. Patrick's day, March 17, was celebrated in the evening by a masque ball at the opera house. There was a large attendance, and vari-colored costumes, some of which were homely as the homeliest, while others were elaborate and gaudy.

March 23, 1905: Nineteen counties in Kansas have county high schools, diplomas from which will admit to the freshmen class at the state university. 
