The burglary was reported at 12:30 p.m. Monday, but Goodland Police estimate it happened Saturday or Sunday.

Reports from Colby and Wa-Keenev indicate Colby's hospital was broken into between 5 and 7 p.m. Mountain Time Sunday, and WaKeeney's hospital was broken into between 3 p.m. Mountain Time Saturday and early Sunday morning. It isn't clear when Oaklev's

There was \$367 taken from the main office at the WaKeeney hospital, said Police Chief Terry Eberle, \$245 from the gift shop and a necklace and ring valued at \$300 from an office.

Oakley hospital, Hahn said; thieves used a lever device to open the door and pried open some cabinets. They ruined a couple of file cabinets, he said. and took \$150-\$200.

### Man fleeing patrol tries to hit officers

A call came at 11:40 a.m. that a chase had broken out on I-70 eastbound near the Colorado boarder.

Kansas Highway Patrol Trooper Joe Greene reported later that Trooper Richard Hageman was chasing Anthony Jose Martinez, 19, when police set out spikes about 11 miles east of Goodland to stop the car.

Butts said Hageman tried to stop the deputy picked him up on Thursday car because Martinez was speeding. He said during the chase, dispatchers discovered the 2003 Ford pickup at the scene and an officer accompahad been stolen.

After rolling over the spikes, Greene reported, Martinez tried to hit three officers with his vehicle. Then, he said, Martinez hit the Motor Co. in Goodland.

Although the report said Martinez was wearing a seat belt, he was listed as disabled at the scene and taken to Eagle Med to Via Christi St. Francis Campus in Wichita with a possible back injury.

A hospital spokesman said they would not release any information about Martinez on Thursday, saying his status could only be obtained through "public sources."
