Two men jailed for stealing bacon, underwear

Sherman County Historical Society Editor's Note: The following includes racial and ethnic terms which are offensive by today's standards. We are printing them because they illustrate the changes in our society in the last century.

April 1, 1905: Harry Downey, colored, and John Edeliriya, a Bohemian, are confined in the county jail charged with the burglary of two Rock Island freight cars in the Goodland yards. One of the men had a predilection for bacon, and the other preferred underwear.

April 3, 1905: Lee Conquest recently sold his property joining town on the east at a price netting him \$1,000 profit on an investment made about one year ago.

He bought the C.H. Lee farm and the old academy place on the Caldwell addition, where he has lived for about a year. The purchaser was F.H. Clark of Selden. The deal was made through G.L. Calvert's real estate agency.

(Historic note: The old academy place refers to the first high school Forster versus Edward Forster, diin the county. Known as "Academy," the boarding school was operated by the Presbyterian church. It was located on the east side of what is now Arcade Street.)

April 4, 1905: Two To The Penitentiary — At the April session of the district court for Sherman County, Harry Downey, colored, and John Eldeliriya, a Bohemian, were arraigned under the charge of burglarizing Rock Island cars in the Goodland yard, were convicted and weekly, some items were arbitrarily were sentenced to the penitentiary. assigned a date.

Parents are asked to bring their child's immunization records, a certified copy of his or her birth certificate and a copy of the child's Social Security card for identification to prevent child abductions.

Immunizations and health as-

sessment must be completed before starting school in the fall. Contacting your doctor or the Sherman County Health Department to update immunizations.

To obtain a copy of your child's birth certificate, write to the Department of Vital Statistics, State Capitol Building, for the state in which your child was born.
