The Goodland Star-News The Cowgirls softball team dropped both games of a doubleheader against the Lady Buffaloes of Garden City High on Friday, losing 7-0 in the first and 11-1 in the second.

In the first game, both teams went scoreless in the first two innings. Garden City got its first run in the top of the third, added two in the fifth and three more in the sixth. The Buffaloes picked up their seventh run in the seventh to make the final

Garden City kept its momentum going in the second game, jumping out to a 4-0 lead in the top of the first inning. Goodland scored its only run of the day in the bottom of the first when junior Melissa Swager drove in sophomore Shandel Simon.

The score remained 4-1 until the top of the fifth inning, when Garden City picked up a run to make it 5-1. In the top of the seventh, the Buffaloes exploded for six runs, then kept the Cowgirls to a "three-and-out" series to win the game 11-1.

Garden City's Katie Ford, a sophomore, pitched both games for the Lady Buffaloes, striking out 11 Goodland batters in the first and seven in the second.

Junior Jordan Frazier lost both games, pitching two complete games. Frazier struck out seven, four in the first game and three in the second.

This was the season opener for both teams.

In the top of the first inning, Frazier needed just seven pitches, with the help of the Cowgirl defense, to retire Garden City's first three batters. After the first two Goodland batters struck out, freshman Samantha Raymer got the Cowgirls' first hit of the season with a single down the right field line.

Next, Swager hit a single through the gap between the shortstop and third, sending Raymer to second. However Ford struck out the next batter to end the inning. Both teams went "three-and-out" in the second.

The Buffaloes got on the scoreboard first when Colleen McMillan hit a double to right center, scoring Freedom VanMeter. She got on base
