April 10, 1905: What Is 'Texas Fever'-Where Is It Prevalent and How Inoculation Immunizes Cattle

arouses inquiry into the exact nature of Texas itch in cattle, in which, mange may be a modification of the disease in more northern climates

The Industrialist says: "Texas Fever is a specific fever of cattle caused by a protozoan in the blood which is conveyed from animal to animal by ticks, leading to engorgement of the spleen and liver and destruction of red globules.

Inoculation is a process by which those animals that are raised free from ticks are rendered immune to Texas fever and is accomplished by injecting hypodermically into each animal from one to three cubic centimeters of fresh, defribinated blood, taken from an immune animal.

Immunizing cattle has a reduction of fatality from 60 percent to about 8 percent. Inoculation is impractical in cattle over two years old.'
