

Program on drug testing for students set for Monday

An educational program on the U.S. Supreme Court's decision to broaden the authority of public schools to test students for illegal drugs will be held Monday in Oakley.

The program will be from 7 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Mountain Time at the Northwest Kansas Education Service Center, 703 W. Second, Oakley. Lunch will be provided. Call the Regional Prevention Center at 785-462-8152 by today to register.

In June 2002, the court ruled to

allow voluntary random drug tests for all middle and high school students participating in competitive extracurricular activities. This ruling greatly expands the scope of school drug testing, said Prevention Center Director Diane Stithem, which previously had been allowed only for student athletes.

It is voluntary, she said, because parents have to consent to it. Students' names are put in a hat, she said, and picked at random. Cheylin High School in Bird City is the only

area school to adopt the policy so far, Stithem said.

This ruling has caused a great deal of questions for public school systems and communities nationwide, she said. But it is up to individual communities and schools to decide if drugs are a significant threat and if testing is an appropriate response.

In response to this decision, the Northwest Kansas Council on Substance Abuse in Colby and the Northwest Kansas Juvenile Services asked William Judge, an attor-

ney and expert in voluntary random student drug testing, to explain the myriad of complex issues involved and answer questions.

He has 20 years of experience with research, consultation, litigation assistance and management training related to the legal issues of substance abuse in the workplace and in the schools.

He is a 10-year instructor for the American College of Occupational and Environmental Medicine Medical Review Officer course, and a

past advisor to the American Society of Addiction Medicine.

Judge has lectured extensively on school and workplace substance abuse issues. He was an invited panelist at the 1988 White House Conference For a Drug Free America and participated in Railway Labor Executives Association vs. Skinner decided by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1989. He has also edited and written many publications.

His most recent projects include the creation of Drug Testing State

Laws 2003 and the National Qualified Collector Registry. Drug Testing State Laws 2003 is an exhaustive web/CD resource of full-text state drug testing laws and court decisions.

Judge also provides risk management assessments, legal and consulting assistance and develops drug-testing policies for schools, employers and labor/management committees. He operates a web site dedicated to this effort at <http://www.lawsinhand.com>.
