Sherman County Historical Society April 23, 1905: Digest of Land Laws — Colby Land Office Issues Information About Government Land and Rules of Homesteading— There are about 220,000 acres of vacant land in this district, of which Wallace has about 64,000; Cheyenne, 54,000; Logan, 53,000; Gove, 18,000; Rawlins, 14,000; Sherman, 6,000; and the remainder is scattered over the rest of the district, being mostly in 40 and 80 tracts that are fit only for grazing purposes.

April 24, 1905: BERRY DAM-AGE SUITS \$26,500 — Widows of Daniel and Alpheus Berry and Roy Berry File Petitions — Three Suits Brought Against Chauncey Dewey and Others in District Court of Sherman County — L.W. Colby Attorney for Plaintiffs — Three damage suits, aggregating a claim of \$26,500, were filed in the district court of Sherman County against Chauncey Dewey and others for the killing of Daniel P. Berry, Alpheus W. Berry and the wounding of William Roy Berry.

In the first case, Harriet M. Berry, widow and administratrix of the estate of Daniel P. Berry, deceased, is plaintiff, and Chauncey Dewey, Clyde Wilson, William J. McBride, Frederick O'Neill, Albert Winship, William J. Ratcliff, Benjamin Slater, Frederick Dye, James Armentrout, Charles Wilson and Edward Tucker are made the defendants.

The petition recites that on June 3, 1903, defendants conspired to injure and did fatally wound by use of firearms her husband, Daniel P.

and in good bodily vigor and was therefore physically capable and did earn for the support of his family one thousand dollars a year; and that he would probably have lived twenty years longer if he had not been killed. Mrs. Berry then alleges that she has been damaged by defendants in the sum of \$10,000 and costs of the suit.

Viola G. Berry, widow and administratrix of Alpheus W. Berry, who, it is charged, was also killed on June 3, 1903, by defendants named in the case recited above. Viola Berry also claims damages upon the grounds of loss of her husband's support and prays for a judgment of \$10,000. The damage suit filed by William

Roy Berry, plaintiff, against the defendants first mentioned in this article is brought for \$6,500, to compensate him for injury by gunshot wound received on June 3, 1903, which tore off a part of his right ear, broke his jaw bone, knocked out some of his teeth, and for other per-

manent disfigurements to his face. Summons in the three cases were assigned a date.
