"I don't think it will get rid of a lot of people," Rasure said, "but it would streamline and help coordinate efforts that should lead to some savings."

"Some cities have contracted law enforcement with the county," said City Manager Ron Pickman.

"Might be more of a problem with an elected sheriff," said County Commissioner Mitch

"Riley County doesn't have a sheriff," Pickman said. "They have a county police chief and Riley County Police Department. There is a board appointed by the city and county to oversee the department."

Rasure said a vote of the people would not be required if the city contracted with the county for law enforcement, but consolidation of the two departments would require

City Commissioner John Garcia said there was a bill in the Legislature to streamline the process, but he was not sure it passed.

Pickman said the proposal would have allowed cities and counties to consolidate services without a bill in the Legislature.

"I think if we do a financially prudent study," Garcia said, "and educate the people about the benefits, it would be approved."
