Man was charged with first degree murder

Sherman County Historical Society May 11, 1905: Bound Over Without Bail — John Anderson, Slayer of John Hill, Charged with First Degree Murder — John Anderson, colored, was bound over by Justice Floyd to the district court to answer to a charge of murder in the first degree for the killing of John P. Hill, colored.

Anderson was brought before the court, waived examination and pleaded "not guilty" to the charge. Justice Floyd thereupon committed the accused man to jail without bond, to await trial in the July term of the district court.

Anderson killed Hill with an ax in a box car used as a bunk and eating house. John Hartzler is the attorney for defendant.
