Water Testing — The Northwest Local Environmental Protection Group does well evaluations, including testing for bacteria and nitrates. To schedule an evaluation or discuss environmental concerns, call the Health Department at 899-4888.

The group charges a \$50 letter of intent fee (similar to a permit) which is good for one year. It is required on the installation or modification of all septic systems in the protection group’s area.

The group will continue to offer free testing to private individuals. However, if you are selling, purchasing or refinancing any property that requires an inspection, the group will charge a \$90 inspection fee. The inspection includes site evaluations on well and septic systems and testing the water. The group will also charge a \$25 fee for child care and foster care inspections.

Man was charged with first degree murder

May 11, 1905: Bound Over Without Bail — John Anderson, Slayer of John Hill, Charged with First Degree Murder — John Anderson, colored, was bound over by Justice Floyd to the district court to answer to a charge of murder in the first degree for the killing of John P. Hill, colored.

Anderson was brought before the court, waived examination and pleaded “not guilty” to the charge. Justice Floyd thereupon committed the accused man to jail without bond, to await trial in the July term of the district court.

Anderson killed Hill with an ax in a box car used as a bunk and eating house. John Hartzler is the attorney for defendant.

May 12, 1905: Secretary of Agriculture to Talk to Farmers in Norton — Hon. James H. Wilson, secretary of agriculture for the United States, and other experts of the agricultural department will speak in Norton Tuesday, May 16.

They will expound subjects of vital interest to the farmers and people of the west, and the Rock Island has taken so much interest in the meeting that a low rate will be given from Goodland to Norton and return.

Mr. Wilson is perhaps the foremost authority on matters of agriculture in the United States.

May 13, 1905: AD — Of Interest To Farmers — Very low rates, open to all, will be made by the Rock Island to enable you to attend the meeting at Norton Tuesday, May 16, which will be addressed by

the Hon. James M. Wilson, Secretary of Agriculture, and other experts of the Agricultural Department on subjects of vital interest to the southwest and west.

The cultivation of crops suitable to our soils and the climate and the work of the government experimental farms will receive attention.
