Water Testing—The Northwest Local Environmental Protection Group does well evaluations, including testing for bacteria and nitrates. To schedule an evaluation or discuss environmental concerns, call the Health Department at 899-4888.

The group charges a \$50 letter of intent fee (similar to a permit) which is good for one year. It is required on the installation or modification of all septic systems in the protection group’s area.

The group will continue to offer free testing to private individuals. However, if you are selling, purchasing or refinancing any property that requires an inspection, the group will charge a \$90 inspection fee. The inspection includes site evaluations on well and septic systems and testing the water. The group will also charge a \$25 fee for child care and foster care inspections.

Williams began losing his eyesight at age 60 due to macular degeneration, but he was still able to put together a 1928 Model A runabout.

Preceding him in death were his parents; two brothers, Doug and Elden; and seven grandchildren.

Gordon Woodrow

Gordon Harold Woodrow, 90, Okanogan, Wash., a 1933 Wallace County Community High School graduate, died Wednesday, March 30, 2005, at the home.

He was born March 24, 1915, the son of Harold and Mabel Woodrow, in a one-room sod house on homestead land east of Kit Carson, Colo. He attended a country school for four years, riding four miles to school on “Old Ruth,” one of the family horses.

Later, the family moved across the state line to Sharon Springs, where he grew up as a farm kid, often driving the six-horse team plowing and harrowing family fields and neighbor lands.

Woodrow earned a Union Pacific Railroad 4-H scholarship to attend Kansas State University, where he earned a Bachelor of Science in animal science.

He was drafted into the Army in 1941 and was accepted into the Air Corps. After completing pilot training, he graduated as a second lieutenant in March 1942 and joined the 12th Tactical Recon Squadron of the 9th Air Force.

In September 1942, Woodrow was stationed in southern England, where he flew British Spitfires for two years. His outfit received P-51 Mustangs in late 1943 and he flew photo reconnaissance in preparation for D-Day.

Woodrow earned the rank of lieutenant colonel and became a squadron commander.

Returning stateside in February 1945, he was assigned as deputy commander at Key Field in Meridian, Miss. There, he met Lt. Muriel Tollefson, and they were married at the base chapel on Oct. 13, 1945. He and his wife settled in Sunnyside, Wash., where he was a farm repre-

sentative for Pacific Power and Light.

In September 1948, they moved to Okanogan, where he was the county extension agent for 31 years. Woodrow helped establish the Okanogan Fair Board, which founded the Okanogan County Fair. He also was the secretary of the Okanogan County Cattlemen’s and Horticulture associations.

He took a cargo of goats to Korea for the Heiger Project in the summer of 1969. He served on the Okanogan City Council for six years and was a 60-year member of the Okanogan Presbyterian Church, where he served as a trustee and an elder.

He was a 72-year member of the Masons and a past master of Okanogan Masonic Lodge. He was a member of the Okanogan Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star and served as Worthy Patron. He was a member of the American Legion.

Survivors include his wife; two brothers, Kenneth Woodrow of Butte, Mont., and Charles Woodrow of Wichita; three daughters, Christie (Robert) Maher of Colville, Wash., Mary (Ron)

Whiteside of Okanogan and Jean (Jeff) Prizant of San Jose, Calif.; two sons, Douglas (Marie) Woodrow of Okanogan and James Woodrow of Seattle; and 11 grandchildren.
