## Visitors bureau buys computer

The Goodland Star-News What do you do when your computer quits and you just can't get it going again? Hopefully, you buy a new one, but for Donna Price, director of the Sherman County Convention and Visitors Bureau, it required a vote from the board.

The board saw the need and voted to buy a new computer for Price at its regular meeting Thursday, May 19.

After some discussion, the board decided to go with a slightly higher bid because it included amenities the other didn't list. S&T Communications gave a bid \$20 lower on the base price of the computer than did RMS Printing of Goodland, but the RMS bid included a larger screen, a larger battery, a oneyear warranty and a faster processor.

The board voted to spend up to \$1,840 on the Dell notebook, software and accessories.

In other business, the board:

• Talked about using a smaller flier rather than the Goodland Guide and decided to get details on the cost of each before choosing.

Voted to renew the contract for three years to rent a billboard advertising Goodland on I-70 outside Salina for \$175 per month.

• Voted to renew for six months a contract for space to distribute brochures from Limon, Colo., to Kansas City.

Voted to buy a half-page, full color ad in the next Kansas Getaway Guide and to pay for listing in the guide the area hotels and campgrounds that collect the guest tax.

### You don't have to pay for what you won

Dear Attorney General Kline: I recently received an email informing me that I was one of the big winners in a Canadian lottery and that I would soon be contacted by phone to verify my prize.

A few days later, the call came but, I was then told I needed to wire several hundred dollars to "hold" my winnings. This didn't seem right so I decided not to send the money. Did I do the right thing?

Dear Kansas Consumer:

Absolutely! The chances are good that many Kansans have been contacted either by e-mail, telephone or letter with similar offers of big financial winnings. Had you decided to send the money up front, you would have learned a painful and costly lesson because there is no lottery and there are no winnings to be had. Because many of these scammers work from outside the United States, once the money is sent, it is usually unrecoverable.

Here are some very important tips to remember when you receive offers like this:

thing you have won (for example, taxes, handling charges or custom clearance fees); tell the caller to take the money from your winnings and



#### send you the rest!

 Be wary of so-called "Nigerian" bank scams, which involve requests for bank account information. Do not give your credit card or bank account number to a caller you do not know; they generally ask for the routing number off your checks and if given these numbers, this person will have access to your checking account.

• Beware if a caller requests money to be sent via wire service or overnight courier. This is a quick, easy and anonymous way for scam artists to get your money and run, as well as to avoid mail fraud.

• Watch out for contests and sweepstakes where you are told to pay "taxes" before receiving any winnings.
