Water Testing — The Northwest Local Environmental Protection Group does well evaluations, including testing for bacteria and nitrates. To schedule an evaluation or discuss environmental concerns, call the Health Department at 899-4888

The group charges a \$50 letter of intent fee (similar to a permit) which is good for one year. It is required on the installation or modification of all septic systems in the protection group's area.

The group will continue to offer free testing to private individuals. However, if you are selling, purchasing or refinancing any property that requires an inspection, the group will charge a \$90 inspection fee. The inspection includes site evaluations on well and septic systems and testing the water. The group will also charge a \$25 fee for child care and foster care inspections

June 12, 1905: The 18th annual session of the Sherman county normal institute opened at the high school building with an attendance of about 50 teachers, and additions to this number will be made this week, as enrollment thus far numbers 53, plus more may register during the next few days.

June 13, 1905: Dewey Is Cleared Again — Charge Brought Before Masonic Lodge — Chauncey Dewey, of Dewey ranch fame in Rawlins County, was tried before the Masonic Lodge of Smith Cen-

ter on the charge of un-Masonic

Dewey is a member of the lodge at Atwood, Rawlins County, and was made a Mason there after locating his ranch in western Kansas. Charges were preferred against him in the Atwood lodge, by members, and the charges grew out of the shooting of the Berry family.

Dewey asked for a change of venue, and it was granted by Grand Master Peters to the Smith Center lodge. Only Masons were permitted at the trial, and only members of the lodge sit as jurors. Dewey is a 32nd degree Mason and lives in Chicago now.

Dewey's trial, together with that of Clyde Wilson and W.J. McBride,



ended in acquittal before the criminal court at Norton about one year ago. It will be a long time before feeling against the men who killed the Berrys dies out in western Kansas
