Baseball in full swing
K-18 team loses to Colby, 8-2

Goodland's K-18 baseball team opened its season Monday with an 8-2 home loss to Colby at Memorial Field.

Colby's Levi Schlick and Kevin Lang both hit doubles in the top of the first inning, each driving in a run for a 2-0 lead.

After the first two Goodland batters struck out in the bottom of the inning, Tanner Smith hit a home run over the fence at left center field to make the score 2-1.

The next batter fouled out to the catcher.

Neither team scored in the second inning. In the top of the third, Colby was able to send its entire lineup to the plate, scoring three runs on five

hits and loading the bases twice. Schlick and Lang again got hits that drove in runs.

In the bottom of the inning, Goodland scored another run when Adam Duell hit a grounder that got past Colby's first baseman, allowing Eric Linnell to get home.

Linnell got on base with a double to center field.

Colby scored two more runs in the top of the fourth, taking a 7-2 lead and holding Goodland scoreless in the bottom of the inning.

Neither team scored in the fifth.

Colby added another run in the sixth to make it 8-2, after which its defense got three of Goodland's four batters out to end the inning.

Neither team scored in the seventh, making 8-2 the final score.

Cameron Morris started on the mound for Goodland, giving up seven runs in four innings and picking up the loss in his first decision of the season.

He struck out three and walked two.

Linnell pitched the last three innings, striking out one and walking two.

Lang pitched the entire game to earn the win, striking out 11 batters and giving up just one walk.

Goodland's next action will be Monday, when the team travels to Atwood.

The first pitch will be around 6:30 p.m. (Mountain Time).

The next home action starts at 6 p.m. Thursday when St. Francis visits its Memorial Field.

Local golfer wins league tourney

Nathan Linin shot a one-under-par 71 to win the boys 14-15 competition of the Northwest Kansas Junior Golf League tournament on Monday at Atwood.

Mikey Doll won the boys 16-17 title with a round of 83 and Ryan Gausman placing third with a 95.

Chelsea Gausman shot 66 for nine holes to win the girls 12-13 competition, with Natasha Hillman finishing second at 71.

Tanner Jones placed second in the boys 8-9 category, shooting a 53 for nine holes.

Other Goodland golfers were Joel Linin and Tyler Jones, both in

the boys 12-13 bracket, shooting a 61 and 62 respectively.

The tournament, played at the Atwood Country Club, was the opening event of the season.

The next tournament is Monday at the Colby Country Club.

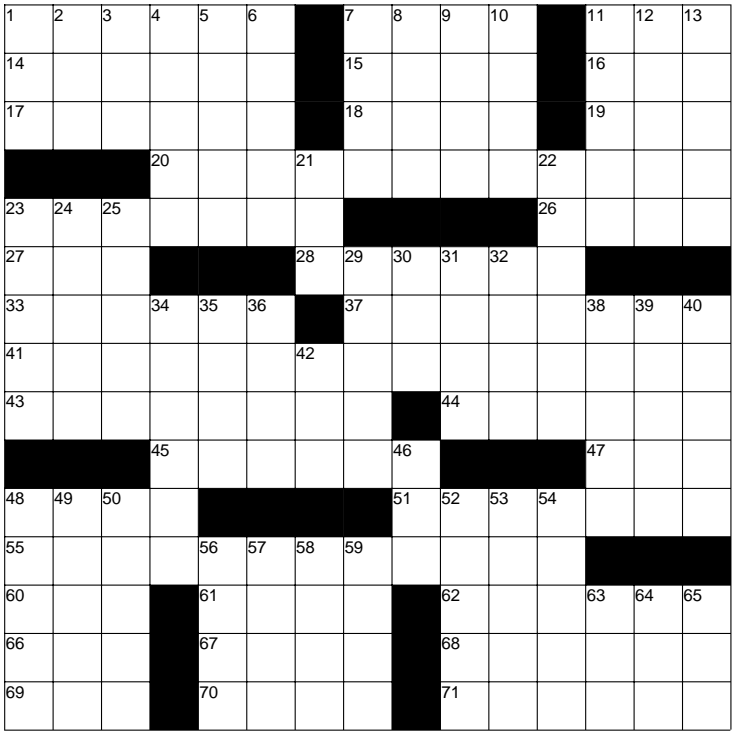

Notorious 'Fleagle Gang'
Fingerprint ends nationwide '20s manhunt

True crime from the roaring 20s, "The Fleagle Gang, Betrayed by a fingerprint," begins with a brazen daylight bank robbery of the First National Bank in Lamar, Colo. on May 23, 1928. Four men are dead, and the robbers escaped.

The author Tom (N.T.) Betz, editor of *The Goodland Star-News*, has spent a lifetime in journalism and on the Great Plains.

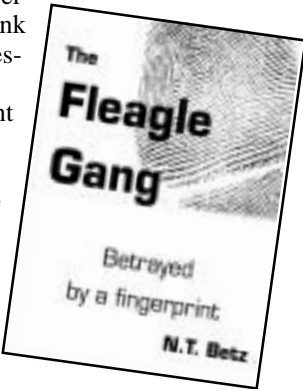
Signed books are available at Knott Just Books of Goodland, Kan.
"It seems to have stirred up quite a bit of interest," said bookstore owner Linda Knott, who is trying to keep the book in stock and on the shelves.

"The Fleagle Gang" details the case which hinges on a single fingerprint found on a murdered Dighton, Kan., doctor's car. The fledgling FBI and new boss J. Edgar Hoover play a crucial role in turning the fingerprint into solid evidence used to find, arrest and convict members of the Fleagle Gang. The FBI credits the Fleagle case as being the first time a single fingerprint was used to identify and convict criminals. The book includes over 100 photos and maps taken from the court files and places where the gang robbed banks.

A U.S. Navy journalist and a graduate of the University of Colorado, Betz started his career delivering papers for his family's newspaper in Lamar, Colo., winning the first of numerous journalism awards as a teenager.

The Fleagle Gang robbed banks and trains in Larned, Kinsley, Marysville, Ottawa and McPherson Kan., Lamar, Colo., Eugene, Ore., Pittsburg, Calif. and countless others of over \$1 million in the 10 years they operated.

Three gang members — Ralph Fleagle, George Abshire and Howard Royston — were "jerked up" at the Colorado Penitentiary a little over two years after committing the Colorado bank robbery. The fourth, Jake Fleagle, was shot on a train in Branson, Mo. in Oct. 1930.
