Kanorado's Fourth of July celebration drew farmers for miles

Sherman County Historical Society July 4, 1905: A Fourth of July Day — The Fourth of July was made a day of genuine celebration in Kanorado this year. Early into the forenoon, the farmers from miles around were seen driving to town not with equipment that marked them in days gone by.

Then people were poor, times were hard, and the outcomes of the country regarded as uncertain. The finest rig they could muster was a hard-looking lumber wagon, drawn by ordinary farm plugs, with harness and other things humbly matching.

Times have changed all this. Today our country people ride to town in single and double-seated carriages. They drive fat, sleek horses, and every part of the equipage shows a relation to prosperity. The numerous teams and conveyances that were gathered around Kanorado J to look upor

It came about in this way: Mr. W.A. Sexson wanted a 'phone to Mr. Linebaugh's, his next door neighbor. He bought a 'phone and some wire, filled in the gaps, wired wire fence.
