



## Paintings, sculptures show 'Parrot Life'

The Goodland Star-News About 40 art fans and former neighbors visited with Sky Keith, at the gallery opening of his avian artwork at the Carnegie Arts Center.

Paintings and sculptures of parrots adorned the center, but the much-anticipated live parrot was absent. Keith, formerly of Goodland, said the bird he had hoped to bring with him is only 12 weeks old, and it was too hot for him to travel for the opening, on Friday, July 1.

The artist did have some tales to tell about his birds. Keith said he has a 4-year-old parrot that has become proficient at imitating what it hears -it talks in his voice and laughs in his wife Carla's and can imitate the phone ringing and bodily functions.

The bird is a Congo African Gray, Keith said; at first, it took months for the bird to learn new things, but now it can imitate things immediately. Since the parrot can imitate flatulence and belches, Keith said, you have to be careful what you do. Keith said the bird's imitation of a phone is so good, it brings him into the house to answer a ringing parrot. The bird "has" its own little phone calls, he said. He acts like he's answering the phone, Keith said, and says, "Sky's Parrot Place.... Yep... Uh-huh.... Talk to you later. Good-bye." Parrots can live over 100 years, Keith said, so people often have to leave them to someone in their wills. Some leave their parrots to the

Gabriel Foundation bird sanctuary, he said, for a permanent home. The foundation in Aspen, Colo., provides education, rescue, rehabilitation, foster care, adoption, sanctuary and conservation of parrots' natural habitats throughout the world. Keith distributed information about the foundation and enve-

lopes to send donations. Keith lives in Denver, where he raises and sells parrots, including, macaws, cockatoos, amazons and greys. His series of paintings called "Parrot Life" and sculptures are on display until Saturday, Aug. 6.
