### Wal-Mart Foundation helps adult education

Students in the Adult Basic Education program at Colby Community College can get help with child care and transportation costs, thanks to a grant from the Wal-Mart Foundation.

# **Cases stemming from hotel fire were settled**

Sherman County Historical Society July 19, 1905: Finally Settled Two cases growing out of the burning of the Commercial Hotel were finally settled.

The J.W. Jenkins' Sons Music company's claim against the judgment in favor of Reta Farley, against the insurance company and A.P. Tone Wilson's claim were settled by agreement. The balance of the judgment was by paid to C.J. Wilson, assignee of the judgment.

This disagreement has been active since the Commercial Hotel burned, along with several other structures, in the fall of 1902.

July 20, 1905: Civil Case -Ernest Harnish and T.W. Taylor disagreed as to whether Mr. Taylor's lease on certain land owned by Mr. Harnish was valid for the year 1905.

They brought their differences into court for settlement — first into Justice Robinson's court, where a jury decided that the lease did not
