his recommendation."

uncomfortable with how the fund is being handled.

"I think we have sufficient checks and balances," Selby replied.

She explained that the training fund and diversion fund are handled through the district court. "These are not public funds," she

said. "These are generated by my office."

She said the training fund pays a fee on a monthly basis, and state law limits what it can be used for.

"We are not complaining about how the money is spent," Commissioner Kevin Rasure said. "We want to be sure that the county is handling this money properly."

"They are not county funds," Selby repeated.

Rumpel and Miller said they disagreed, and cited an attorney general's opinion on the subject.

"I don't see a problem," Selby said. "Bauer doesn't have a complaint. He is suggesting this change, but we are not out of compliance."

"There is no statutory authority of how the money is being handled," Rumpel said.

"Yes there is," Selby said, "and I don't think that is what Bauer said." "Training is not what we are talk-

ing about," Rumpel said. "It is the diversion fund.'

"I'm not going to roll over and let this happen," Selby said. "I have been assured this is being done properly since the fund was set up long before I took office."

Commissioner Chuck Thomas asked what the diversion fund is used for.

Selby said she has used the money to purchase office equipment, but has not done much lately. Thomas asked how much money there was.

Miller said the training fund had \$1,974 and the diversion fund had \$11,009 as of the end of June.

Selby said she hasn't used the diversion money in quite some time, and agreed the fund is high.

"I work with Miller to redirect funds from the training fund to keep the monthly dues down," Selby said. "The training fund pays 50 percent per month of income for dues.'

"You are administrator of the funds?" Thomas said. "It is your fund."

"Yes," Selby said. "We have up-Treasurer Miller said she was dated our computers and bought a new copier.

"We get the money from those cases where the person accepts a diversion program. That will change with the new DUI laws, where it does not come off your record with a diversion."

"Shelby (Miller) writes the check when I ask her to and give her an invoice," Selby said. "Shelby's name is on the check. I do not have personal access to these funds. A purchase order is totally redundant. It is not something Bauer says has to be done.'

Miller said, "it (purchase order) would take me off the hook. All the other offices go through the voucher process.'

Selby asked about other funds that do not go through the voucher process, citing the sheriff's commissary fund.

Miller said the commissary fund has a separate checking account because the money is not technically a county fund.

Tiede asked if the system should be left the way it is.

Rasure said he felt the commissioners need to see the documentation.

"As long as there is a system in place," Thomas said, "and there are two names on the checks."

"And one of those names is not mine," Selby added.

She offered to provide the commissioners with an accounting of what has been spent.

Rumpel said she felt the diversion money should be deposited in the general fund, and at the end of the meeting handed Tiede a copy of an attorney general's opinion on the matter written in April 1997.

The opinion says that diversion fees "received by a county attorney pursuant to a pay-and-dismiss policy should be paid to the county treasurer as directed by state law. credited to the general fund, and handled according to budgetary procedures applicable to all moneys deposited in the county general
