Sherman County had abundant wheat, rye

By Evelyn Ward

Sherman County Historical Society July 25, 1905: The editor of this paper had an opportunity of riding over about 10 miles of the plains of Sherman County encountering on the way wheat, rye, barley and other crops of an abundant yield; small groups of trees and larger groves.

We saw men, houses, schools, cattle, water — the compliment and equipment of a civilization that makes one think of "easy street."

Four miles east of Goodland on the Bruner place is a young grove of 10 acres that has come up from the seed with only natural rainfall.

The country on either side of the road from Goodland to Edson is white with ripening grain, and in many cases, the grain has been cut and stacked. Some of the harvested wheat will yield 35 bushels per acre
